Speramus Meliora: Resurget Cineribus. ("We hope for better things; it will rise from the ashes.")

This Latin phrase became the motto of Detroit on the city's official flag after the city's Great Fire of 1805. Following many prosperous decades, the motto returned after the city's racial turbulence of the 1960s. Since the '60s, Detroit has faced serious challenges. But take heart, ye jaded urbanites, changes are afoot.

The New York Times, a reliable herald of come-back cities, ran a handsome full-page feature on Detroit by Amy S. Eckert (June 14, 2025, p. C9, five color photos). She begins with hope and perspective:

"The city that gave us automobiles and the music of Motown has seen some tough times, but it has a knack for recovering from adversity. Detroit's renaissance is palpable as it celebrates the restoration of the 1913 Beaux-Arts Michigan Central train station (now a tech innovation hub for Ford Motor) and anticipates the completion of the Gordie Howe International Bridge. And the city now buzzes with the success of the Detroit Lions!" Thank you, Amy Eckert.

And may we add: There's no overlooking the revitalization of Detroit's Wayne State University. Its large campus (many buildings designed by Yamasaki) continues to expand ~ a \$200M Health Sciences Research Building; an Integrative Biosciences Center; the WSU Stem Innovation Center; newly modernized high-rise dorms welcoming out-of-state and international students; etc. And with special pride, WSU welcomes its 13^{th} president – and *first woman president* -- Dr Kimberly Andrews Espy. But just now, the city is buzzing about the **Detroit Festival of Books**, July 20th. Here are highlights from the event's talented founder:



Author Note Maureen E. Mulvihill is a native Detroiter: "I was born in the city ~ lived, studied, and taught there during my early years. Detroit is the largest, most dynamic city in the state of Michigan. It is also an urban laboratory, and my years in the city were formative. I had inspiring professors in the '60s at Monteith College, Wayne State University: the strong political ethos of those times never left me." Maureen went on to teach at the University of Detroit with Visiting Artist, Sir Tyrone Guthrie; then, Wisconsin (PhD '82); and then, Columbia University Rare Book School, Yale Center for British Art, and (as NEH Fellow) Johns Hopkins. She is a rare book collector, a literary scholar, and a longtime member of the Princeton Research Forum, NJ. Her publications (books, essays, reviews) are listed at Google Scholar. After 30 years in Brooklyn, she relocated to southwest Florida, where she was VP, 2012-2015, Florida Bibliophile Society. As a Guest Writer & Researcher for Rare Book Hub (2016 -), she has contributed literary articles and several Detroit pieces. She is presently a Senior Editor of the venerable *Scriblerian* literary journal, and her present research interest is early Irish women writers.
